Description of Program: A BRS shelter level non-secure co-ed facility. We are located just south of Coos Bay OR. Referrals are accepted statewide.

The program provides a structured and supportive environment to assist youth in preparing for transition to their next placement.

Services include weekly individual and group skill building, Skill Streaming, Stress Management, Aggression Replacement Training, Thinking for a Change, Seeking Safety, Pathways, Problem Solving, Thinking, Feeling and Behavior and Recreation (on and offsite).

There is an on-site year round alternative school that provides youth with credit recovery opportunities.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

Referrals should include: Referrals should include if applicable, Case Plan, IEP, any current evaluation, assessments, or other documents which provide background information and/or support the need for the current level of services and conditions mandated by the court (copy of probation order) would assist in a decision for placement.

Description of Programs:

Seneca Program: The Seneca program serves females ages 10-17 who are in need of shelter, evaluation, and recommendations for future placements. Youth are either placed in the Seneca House in Southeast Portland or in one of our certified foster homes. Youth are provided with behavioral rehabilitation services and engage in skill building opportunities throughout the day. Youth attend a DART (Day and Residential Treatment) school which tailors curriculum and activities to meet youth's individual academic needs. Youth served are supervised at all times by highly skilled staff trained on crisis intervention, counseling and support. Staff have special expertise in grief and loss work and permanency promotion for youth. The on site case manager coordinates services for the youth, including medical and mental health services, facilitation of service plan meetings, and provides goal focused individual and group counseling. While youth placed at Seneca receive outpatient mental health services through partner agencies, Seneca also has an on site mental health therapist who can provide counseling to youth if there is a delay between their intake date and their first mental health appointment. The Seneca on site therapist can also facilitate family counseling and mediation, in addition to supporting the family with a transition plan, if the youth will be returning home. Both the mental health therapist and case manager work with all clients on immediate and long term goals and also engage in them in activities to assist in their progress towards permanency. The overarching goal for all youth is to move them closer to permanency than they were when they came in. This goal is reached through our staff advocacy efforts, programming to support youth in building capacity for permanency, and our staff's work to identify and strengthen permanent adult connections. Youth can remain in care as long

as they qualify for behavioral rehabilitative services and continue to require the level of services being offered.

Independent Living Services (ILS) Program: The ILS program serves females between the ages of 16 and 18 who are moving towards adulthood and do not have adult guardians or housing resources. Youth are served in therapeutic foster homes. In order to qualify for placement, youth must present with behaviors that require behavioral rehabilitative services, such as problems with anger management, which would be addressed by providing coaching to youth on appropriate methods to manage anger and tolerate frustration. Youth engage in individual and group gender based programming in order to strengthen their social skills and improve on their ability to engage in healthy relationships. A key goal of the program is to provide youth with safe and stable housing in a certified foster home, coordinate a connection with an ILP worker who can help them with independent living skills, and to assist them in accessing resources available to them. The case manager ensures that youth are set up with health insurance, medical, mental health services, and school. The school element varies from case to case as some youth may be attending high school and others may be working towards their GED. The educational component of the program is tailored to meet the individual needs of each youth. The case manager also coordinates and facilitates all service planning and meetings associated with the youth's case. The staff working with youth in this program have special expertise in grief and loss work and permanency promotion. The overarching goal for all youth is to move them closer to permanency than they were when they came in. This goal is reached through our staff advocacy efforts, programming to support youth in building capacity for permanency, and our staff's work to identify and strengthen permanent adult connections. Youth are eligible to remain in the ILS program for up to two years, as long as they continue to require BRS to address problematic behaviors.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

Referrals should include: A complete BRS referral packet, including any previous provider information including psychological evaluation, drug and alcohol/ assessment if applicable.

Description of Program: Chehalem Youth and Family services is a community based placement with 24 hour awake staff. We provide Behavior Rehabilitation Services to youth in three homes. All of our programs are individually planned for each youth and strive to help them make successes to move to a less restrictive environment.

Chehalem House provides services to boys aged 13+ who are focused on reunification, movement to less restrictive environment or foster home. These youth are often working on behaviors such as impulsivity, aggression

and verbal outbursts. We use a behavior modification system using steps and levels and point accumulation.

Sarah Street House provides services to girls aged 13+ who are focused on reunification, movement to less restrictive environment, foster homes, or independent living. These youth are often working on behaviors such as emotion regulation, aggression, impulsivity and verbal outbursts. We use a behavior modification system using steps and levels and point accumulation.

Harrison House provides services for boys aged 13+ who are focused on exiting care to independent living. These youth are often working on behaviors such as impulsivity, aggression, and other outbursts - but need to also work on independent living skills such as obtaining and maintaining a job, home and other facets of independence.

Additionally we provide multiple wraparound services including Mental Health Services - Provided by the Chehalem Counseling Center, Educational Services, Vocational Services - Provided by My First Job and Yamhill Youth Opportunities Programs, Mentoring and Pet Club. Each of these wrap around services provides an opportunity for youth to participate in normal social behaviors and develop appropriate social skills.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

Referrals should include: Recent Psychological Evaluation (within one year) that includes a IQ in the borderline range, DHS case plan with information about aftercare, IEP (if they are on one) and any information on law violations.

Description of Program: Youth receive structured 24-hour supervision in a staff secure setting, with anticipated length of stay of 30-90 days. The aftercare goal is for the youth to transition to a longer term residential or foster/familial placement.

The needs of the youth in the program will be addressed by:

- a) Providing an atmosphere of control and support that allows youth to feel safe, secure and able to progress on treatment issues. Because of this milieu, the staff can concentrate on providing youth with a positive growth experience
- b) Establishing clear expectations of behavior and an accompanying system of accountability for residents and staff that promote mutual respect, self-discipline, and order. Youth at admission are provided with a thorough verbal program orientation and with a secure treatment orientation manual to read and refer to.

- c) Identifying and effectively responding to youth's health, mental health and related behavioral problems throughout the course of confinement in the treatment program, through the use of professionally appropriate diagnostic, treatment and intervention protocols.
- d) Operating the treatment program in a manner that is consistent with principals of fairness, providing the means of ensuring and protecting youth and family legal rights.
- e) Providing meaningful opportunities and services for youth to improve their educational and vocational competence, to effectively address underlying behavioral problems and to prepare them for responsible lives in the community.
- f) Participation in individual, family and group counseling and skill building provided by BRS - Shelter staff and other qualified trained mental health professionals.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

Description of Program: Eastern Oregon Academy provides Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS), within a staff secure residential treatment facility, for male adolescents from the ages of twelve to twenty-one. Within the BRS program, EOA provides such services as therapeutic work experience, independent living training, milieu therapy, cultural activities, therapeutic recreational activities, transition/aftercare planning and evidenced based skills training, such as Aggression Replacement Training(ART), Dialectical Behavioral Training (DBT), Changing Offender Behavior (COB), conflict resolution, etc. EOA also partners with various community teams to ensure that each youth's academic, medical and mental health needs are met.

Youth residing at Eastern Oregon Academy typically have failed to thrive in a less restrictive setting and may have a long history of social, emotional and behavioral difficulties. To include but not limited to; being physically and verbally aggressive towards others, running away, problems with authority, lack of pro-social skills, depression, poor conflict resolution skills, a lack of trust in adults, feelings of hopelessness or helplessness, impulsivity, and poor interpersonal relationships.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

- BRS Authorizaton signed by LPHA at intake
- Contracted Child Placement Referral
- Child Specific Case Plan at intake & Child Placement Information for Foster Care and Residential Placement
- An approved contact list for the youth

Special Attributes: Sexually Aggressive Behaviors, Behavioral and Emotional Difficulties

Not Appropriate: Youth who cannot be maintained in a foster home setting

Description of Programs:

Therapeutic Foster Care Program: The Therapeutic Foster Care Program is based on the individual needs of the youth within the context of their therapeutic home. The multi-disciplinary treatment team develops specific behavioral goals and interventions for each youth using the setting of the treatment family, school, and the community as part of the treatment process. The goal is for the youth to return home, be placed in long-term foster care, or adoption, as soon as the youth demonstrates readiness. This is determined by the treatment team and discussed monthly. Youth from Southern Oregon are given preference; referrals are accepted from across the state.

The program integrates several treatment modalities to meet the individual needs of each child and family. These include individual, group, and family counseling; structured recreation; building community connections; academic tutoring; skills training and supervised academic study time; and vocational training. In addition to these components, therapy is provided to help stabilize children and promote the development of appropriate coping and conflict resolution skills as well as anger control. The treatment helps participants improve peer and family relationships, and it reduces the effects of behavioral and emotional disorders.

Description of BRS Residential Program: The BRS residential program is located at 650 S. 4th Street in Central Point, Oregon. The residential program is based on the individual needs of the youth within the context of the group home. The multi-disciplinary treatment team develops specific behavioral goals and interventions for each youth using the group living environment, school, and the community as part of the treatment process. The goal is for the youth to return home, emancipation, be placed in long-term foster care, or adoption, as soon as the youth demonstrates readiness. This is determined by the treatment team and discussed monthly. Youth from

Southern Oregon are given preference; referrals are accepted from across the state. The program integrates several treatment modalities, including: individual, group, and family counseling, individual and group skill building activities, structured recreation, building community connections, special education, supervised academic study time, and vocational training.

In addition to these components, therapy is provided to stabilize youth and promote the development of appropriate coping skills, anger control, conflict resolution skills, and to improve peer and family relationships. The specific array of services delivered to each youth is determined by an individualized planning process using a team approach that involves the youth, family members, case workers, service providers, and advocates. This process consists of a thorough assessment of the strengths and needs of the youth, identification of desired outcomes, and the services needed to achieve the identified outcomes.

Youth accepted into the program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

Kairos Community Services Programs provides children with a constellation of services and supports, planned through the wraparound service planning process, and inclusive of skills training, case management, traditional outpatient psychotherapy, and treatment foster care. Services are evidence based, with Collaborative Problem Solving the fundamental interactive approach. The program serves individuals from throughout Oregon in the beautiful Rogue Valley. Our goal is to help youth develop the necessary skills to transition to their homes with their families or into mainstream community settings.

The staff available includes a site manager who is a licensed therapist, a psychiatric provider, two individual and family therapists, four skills coaches, two treatment foster care coordinators, a family support specialist, and an office manager.

At Kairos Community Services Programs treatment is focused on developing a vision of a better future by focusing on the positive. The central, motivating message is a better future — that people can and do overcome obstacles. We do this through:

- Person Centered Planning based on the individual’s unique strengths, needs, preferences, experiences and cultural backgrounds, with participation of the youth in all decisions that effect them;
- Promoting self-advocacy by supporting each person in taking the lead in their own planning and establishing self-direction
- Focusing on all aspects of the individual’s life-mind, body, spirit and community.

Special Attributes: Program emphasizes high level of supervision, structure and routine in foster homes, increasing contact with prosocial peers, developing sustainable prosocial interests. Our Family Counseling component is ideal for youth who have an aftercare resource in need of individualized practice in parent management strategies, including families who may have had very conflictual past relationships.

Not Appropriate:

- Youth with recent histories of severe aggression
- Youth with active suicidality or very recent severe attempt

- Youth in need of sexual offender treatment

- Youth requiring a treatment program that includes physical restraint by staff or foster parent

Description of Program:

We provide Multidimensional Treatment Foster Care (MTFC) placement with trained foster family; access to 24/7 support; Individual Counseling and Skills Training; Family Counseling and Parent support; School Consultation and Advocacy; and Psychiatric Medication Management (if needed). MTFC is an evidence-based treatment program for youth with significant behavioral problems that put them at risk for higher levels of care.

How do program staff work with the youth?

Our treatment team is composed of several roles, directed by the Program Supervisor.

Program Supervisor: is the principle contact for the foster parents and the referral agent. The Program Supervisor coordinates the members of the treatment team and works to insure that the multiple interventions are coordinated and that the young person's care is coherent.

Family Counselor: The primary objective of OCP treatment foster care services is to successfully return young people to their aftercare home (e.g., bio-family member, adoptive resource, long-term foster parent). The family counselor identifies strengths and needs of aftercare families and develops a plan for the family to learn and practice effective parenting skills. This includes training in encouragement systems, limit setting, supervision, and other parenting strategies.

Individual Counselor: meets weekly with youth to practice and reinforce skills for improving behavior and to provide therapeutic support for youth concerns. Sessions typically occur out in the community. Youth typically perceive their individual counselor as a cheerleader and advocate.

Skills Coach: The goal of the skills coach is to initiate any involvement that will offer support to the youth/family after program exit. The skills coaches model and reinforce positive social skills and create opportunities for youth to practice new skills in the community. These sessions are typically reinforcing and fun for youth, and are targeted toward skills that have interfered with successful family placement in the past.

How long is your program?

While Nexus is a time limited treatment program, placements are focused on meeting the needs of the individual youth and supporting their family so that the youth may remain in the community after exiting the program. Placements typically last 6-12 months. We have found that when an aftercare resource of some type is identified early in treatment that the duration of stay in our program is shorter and youth are more likely to successfully graduate and maintain skills into the aftercare environment.

Can youth stay permanently in the foster home if they do well?

The Nexus Program is a community resource made up of treatment foster parents who are interested in time-limited placements. Our emphasis is on stabilizing the behaviors of a youth that impede them from being successful in a less restrictive long term placement such as in a biological or adoptive family or regular foster care. We emphasize working with an aftercare resource for a youth from the beginning of placement in order to give the youth a clear picture of their graduation plan. This means that we do not encourage our professional foster parents to keep youth permanently in their homes. As foster parents take in and graduate youth, their skills for stabilizing behavior improve and we are able to serve more youth more effectively.

How do you work with schools?

The OCP program supervisor meets with the school upon placement and does ongoing school consultation to establish a plan that can meet the youth's academic and behavioral needs. All program youth carry daily school cards that facilitate communication with schools and catch problems when they are small. We emphasize youth being placed in the most mainstream, least restrictive school setting that can meet their needs. Our high level of coordination between home and school often allows program youth to be successful in much less restrictive settings than they have previously experienced. Most of the youth in our program have IEPs and many require specialized school services.

As a caseworker, I am used to coordinating directly with therapists and schools. How is your program different?

The OCP program supervisor coordinates between school, foster parent, medical providers, and other important people in the youth's life. While caseworkers certainly can talk with anyone directly, the OCP program supervisor can be the best source of up-to-date, comprehensive information about the youth. Caseworkers are encouraged to get in touch with the OCP program supervisor at any time with specific questions or concerns about the youth. Our program is structured with clear, separate roles for each staff member in order to make treatment clear and predictable for the youth and families involved. To do this, it is helpful if all professionals start inquiries with the program supervisor.

What if the youth I'm referring needs a specialized service in addition to what you provide?

Because of the intensive level of service and time demands of our specialized treatment program, we typically ask that youth not have additional therapeutic obligations while receiving MTFC services. Randomized-controlled testing of MTFC has shown that youth participating in our treatment program alone can make and sustain changes in a wide variety of areas (e.g., externalizing behaviors, internalizing symptoms, substance use, criminal offending, health-risking sexual behavior, attachment disorders, and biological indicators of stress). Therefore, even when there are difficulties that cannot be directly targeted during care; we may see reductions in these needs and can assist with a thorough assessment of future needs as the young person gets ready to exit the program. We also encourage youth involvement in pro-social community activities; we have found that it is helpful when youth are not spending all of their time in treatment activities.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.

Referrals should include: Typical referral packet is acceptable to open a referral. Youth who may be appropriate for program must participate in an in-person screening as part of referral process.

All residential service program elements, including behavioral milieu management, Token Economy behavior management program, individual, group and family counseling are manualized and based on empirically supported methods for use with this population to the standard of Evidence-based or Promising Practice levels. Evidence based and time-tested methods guide all services using a theoretical orientation based on principles of cognitive-behavioral and social learning methods.

The residential program offers a full-time staff secure placement. Crisis intervention or counseling is available on a 24-hour basis. Three cottages are highly structured, using a program of scheduled activities of daily living, structure and support to accommodate group and individual needs. Description of Program:

Enhanced Therapeutic Foster Care (“Klahre House”): A residential treatment program offering day treatment services in a Therapeutic Foster Care setting. Individual, group and family treatment and skill building are provided by qualified professional staff. Treatment needs addressed include: sexually aggressive behaviors, criminogenic behaviors, self harm, emotional disturbance with behaviors, and other behavioral factors that may inhibit a youth’s successful progression through adolescent development while maintaining community safety. The program provides a highly structured, therapeutic environment that emphasizes individual treatment planning, experiential growth, academic progress and behavior change. On-site school provides fully accredited academic educational opportunities as well as GED instruction for youth who do not attend community based educational programs. Youth attend structured classes around a core curriculum of Math, Science, History, Language Arts, Reading, Physical Education and Computer Resources. Youth are provided an opportunity to work at their own pace and level of ability while being encouraged to be successful.

Description of Program:

The Visions Program

At Youth Progress we believe in tailoring a young person's treatment to make it as individual as possible. This is especially important when working with younger clients or with youth who have not yet developed the aptitude for abstract thought.

To address this, Youth Progress developed the Visions Program, one of Youth Progress's day services programs. Clients attend groups and appointments at the Visions office during the day and spend evenings and weekends in proctor homes. Visions is a program where youth are provided an environment and support for emotional growth and the development of lagging skills so that they may become productive members of their community and help reduce risk factors for future generations. Success of the Visions program is dependent upon the interaction between multiple treatment variables including the physical environment, the staff, the youth, the youth's community team, and the use of specific interventions and program structure. The program is based upon Social Learning Theory- the belief that human functioning is an interaction between personal factors, behavior, and the environment (Bandura, 1986) and that interventions or variables that affect one factor also has an impact on the other factors. For example, research supports that behavioral problems arise in response to environmental triggers that are due to deficits in the development of important cognitive skills (i.e., skills that are needed for the development of flexibility, frustration tolerance, and problem-solving) (Greene & Ablon, 2006). In addition, Vision's staff believe that the youth are doing the best that they can to

manage their world and cope with daily stressors with the skills that they have in that moment

Our goal is to provide youth with a safe, structured environment where they are provided with appropriate treatment and can practice becoming productive citizens.

Treatment

Youth in the Visions Program enter the agency with a variety of mental health and/or community safety issues. To address these issues Youth Progress staff uses evidence-based, therapeutic approaches when working with these youth, as well as offering counselors that specialize in specific treatment areas. Visions is unique because of the use of intensive, individualized behavior modification and the team approach of the staff.

Staff in the Visions Program have become adept at using therapeutic methods to assist clients as they modify their behaviors. Program staff combine traditional Behavior Modification methods with Evidence-Based practices such as Skill Streaming and Motivational Interviewing. Although the methods are generally initially met with resistance, the program has developed a track record of producing youth who are able to regulate their own behaviors and to find internal motivation for change. In the past, youth have gone from not wanting to examine their own behaviors at all to taking the initiative to identify their own target behaviors and developing a system to track their progress.

The Mariposa Program

Providing support and opportunity for female youth to grow into productive young women by building self-confidence, encouraging empowerment, and fostering independent living skills.

The Mariposa Program provides services for females ranging in age from 15 to 21. Mariposa is a gender-responsive program, structured to meet the needs of females. Mariposa's core is based upon the concept of a butterfly's life cycle, where growth is encouraged and

reinforced through the stages of change. Youth progress through the stages based on their individualized needs and development within six domains: relational, emotional, intellectual, sexual, physical, and spiritual. Once the youth becomes a butterfly, she has demonstrated full growth and preparedness to move onward into independent living. Depending on the client, this process may take anywhere from three months to two years. Programs that are gender-specific have shown to be more effective and relevant to females' experiences, issues, and challenges, and are able to fulfill the previously unmet needs of adolescent females. Utilizing Oregon's Guidelines for Effective Gender-Responsive Programming (2002) for structure, implementation, and evaluation, the newly developed Mariposa Program offers female-specific services that are relevant to their strengths, abilities, experiences, and needs. Mariposa youth have experienced numerous barriers, including sexual abuse, physical abuse, emotional abuse, and parental neglect. Most of our girls also have a history of delinquency, emotional problems, mental health issues, and substance abuse. Mariposa youth may also experience low cognitive and social functioning levels. Many lack appropriate parental and family support.

Youth accepted into this program must be determined eligible for BRS and require BRS authorization.
