Keynote Speakers



Cory Jewell Jensen

Cory Jewell Jensen, M.S. is the Co-Director of the Center for Behavioral Intervention in Beaverton, Oregon. She has worked with adult sex offenders and their families for 30 years and provided training and consultation to The National Center for the Prosecution of Child Abuse, The United States Navy, The Mark McGwire Foundation for Children, the US Marshall's Office, the NYPD Special Victim's Unit and a number of law enforcement, child advocacy and Faith based organizations.

Ms. Jensen served as the Executive Director for the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers, chaired two of ATSA's International Research and Treatment Conferences, served as President of the Oregon Chapter of ATSA and chaired the Offender Management Committee attached to the Oregon Attorney General's Sexual Assault Task Force. She is an instructor for Portland State University's Child Welfare Training Institute and also provided training for Oregon's police academy (DPSST).

Ms. Jensen has been the recipient of Oregon's "Commercial Crime Prevention Award," the "Champions for Children Award," the Oregon Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers "Significant Achievement Award," the Nunnenkamp "Award of Excellence," and the Jan Hindman Memorial Award. She has published a number of articles related to sex offender treatment, risk management, and child abuse prevention. She has testified as an expert witness in local and federal courts and been a featured guest on radio talk shows and the Oprah Winfrey Show.



Judges Panel

Honorable Amy Holmes Hehn - Judge Amy Holmes Hehn received a B.S from Willamette University and a J.D. from Suffolk University College of Law. She served as a prosecutor for the Multnomah County District Attorney's Office for 25 years. While there she was the head of the Domestic Violence Unit, and the Juvenile Unit. She also served in the Office's Multidisciplinary Child Abuse Team. She has worked with various task forces and organizations, including the Oregon Law Commission Juvenile Code Revision Work Group and Multnomah County Family Violence Coordinating Council.

Honorable Valeri Love - Beginning her legal career as a judicial clerk for the Honorable Darryl L. Larson in 1995, Judge Love returned to the Circuit Court to serve on the bench in 2011 by appointment. Prior to her service with the court, she worked as a Deputy District Attorney for the Lane County District Attorney's Office where she primarily handled domestic violence and financial fraud cases. Throughout her career, Judge Love has been involved with numerous organizations and activities including the Lane County Bar Association, Oregon Asian Pacific American Bar Association, and Oregon Women lawyers. Judge Love currently serves as the Juvenile Court Judge.

Honorable Patricia Sullivan - Judge Patricia Sullivan has been a Circuit Court Judge for the past ten years in Malheur County, Oregon. Prior to becoming a Judge, she was the District Attorney for Malheur County for twelve years. She graduated from Lewis and Clark College in 1975 with a degree in history, and the University of Oregon School of Law in 1978. Judge Sullivan handles juvenile delinquency and dependency matters, as well as adult civil and criminal cases. Judge Sullivan is married and has two adult daughters, and one grandson.

C1. Working with Interpreters

Ms. DeLeon-Benham will discuss the role of the interpreter in CRB proceedings. She will also provide practice tips for conducting reviews when an interpreter is present for a review.

C2. Knowing Who You Are

DHS has adopted the Knowing Who You Are (KWYA) curriculum developed by Casey Family Programs. This 25-minute video is just one component of the 2-day training. In the video, 23 individuals (youth in care, alumni, child welfare professionals, birth families, and resource families) share their perspectives about why race and ethnicity matter and the importance of helping youth in out-of-home care develop a healthy sense of racial and ethnic identity. The issues raised in the video represent important aspects of development that require a caseworker's concerted effort and attention for each youth's ongoing sense of self, security and well-being. Following the video, there will be structured, small group discussions and an opportunity to develop questions that a CRB might ask during the review to identify how and encourage DHS to incorporate this work in day to day practices.

C3. An Immigrant's Perspective

This workshop is a presentation by Mr. Catalani, who works with NW Communities Counsel. He will describe his history of immigrating to the United States, eventually becoming a member of the Oregon State Bar, and his work with immigrant and refugee communities in both Marion and Multnomah County.

D1. CRB Review of Voluntary Cases

This workshop will go over the recently developed technical assistance guide for the CRB for reviewing cases of children who are in foster care under a voluntary agreement between a parent or legal guardian and the Department of Human Services (DHS). Clarify the confusion, myths and misperceptions and learn how to apply the CRB findings in voluntary cases.

Explore the service needs of youth who have or will become involved in both the child welfare and juvenile justice systems. Discuss dually-involved youth and dually-adjudicated youth. D4. When Children are Placed Out of State: Understanding the ICPC Process

Attendees will learn brief history of the Interstate Compact for Placement of Children (ICPC) with an overview of the Compact's core articles and regulations. They will gain an understanding of the ICPC process, including referrals, home studies, approvals, denials, placements and time-frames, ongoing courtesy supervision of ICPC placements, ICPC quarterly reports, and Border Agreement with WA State.
