This memo will familiarize you with the resources we have to support your work in handling juvenile, family, and protective proceeding cases--to introduce the team and provide resources.

In the Juvenile and Family Court Programs Division (JFCPD) at OJD we provide support to judges, court staff, and stakeholders for both the dependency and delinquency systems, domestic relations, and protective proceedings. Our juvenile unit includes the Juvenile Court Improvement Program (JCIP) for dependency cases, the Juvenile Delinquency Improvement Program (JDIP) for delinquency, Family Treatment Court (FTC) programs, and the Citizen Review Board (CRB). JCIP and JDIP staff provide ongoing training and support and are available to answer questions.

The family law unit supports the work of the <u>Statewide Family Law Advisory Committee</u> (SFLAC), the State Protective Proceedings Advisory Committee (SPPAC), and various other subject matter committees. Family law staff provide subject matter expertise and educational opportunities on multiple areas of the law including domestic relations, child support, facilitation and mediation services, probate, and domestic violence.

JUVENILE RESOURCES

Here are a few juvenile resources that you might find helpful during your time on the bench:

• Juvenile Judges' <u>SharePoint</u> (a platform for resources and training for judges, with links to prior program videos and materials).

JCIP hosts an annual juvenile judges conference in early August called "Through the Eyes of a Child," —<u>materials are available here</u>.

JCIP also hosts an annual multidisciplinary summit in September called the "Model Court Summit," which is focused on court improvement and supporting the model court teams to make local improvements.

Finally, JCIP hosts a bi-annual Mini-CANI (Child Abuse and Neglect Institute), which is geared towards judges who are newer to handling dependency cases.

Juvenile dependency judges have a group called the Judicial Engagement and Leadership Institute (JELI) that provides curriculum guidance for the Through the Eyes of a Child conference and hosts a semi-annual Spring Convening. JELI also provides an opportunity to be involved in forms development and hosts a judge chat on the Microsoft Teams platform.

Juvenile delinquency judges have a group called the JDIP Judges' Committee that brings judges' voices to the JDIP Advisory Committee and curriculum development for the annual Juvenile Justice Judges Conference.
