## New Law in Residential Landlord-Tenant Cases: Nonpayment of Rent

## Important information for landlords

The new law extends the notice period required before you can file an eviction complaint for nonpayment of rent. If you file a complaint and it is dismissed by a judge because you did not comply with the new law, your filing fee will not be refunded.

- Notice of termination for nonpayment of rent must give the tenant 10 or 13 days to comply.
- You MUST deliver a copy of the notice posted on our website with:
  - A notice for termination for nonpayment of rent, AND
  - A summons seeking possession based on nonpayment.

- The court MUST dismiss a nonpayment eviction proceeding if the court finds:
  - You failed to deliver the notice required;
  - You caused the tenant to not tender rent (this includes failing to reasonably participate with a rental assistance program); OR
  - You received the rent owed under the notice of termination
