


PLANNING TO USE ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI)

Generative artificial intelligence (AI) can create content by looking at patterns in large collections of data. ChatGPT and AI Overview are examples of generative AI that sums up data and creates content based on user prompts. Unlike traditional AI, generative AI mimics human creativity. Generative AI is a tool that can help you write or explain things, but it can make mistakes. For legal issues, it must be used very carefully. It is a starting place not an ending place.

AI may be able to help you:

- Write drafts of letters, forms, or court papers
- Fix grammar and improve your writing
- Explain legal words in plain language
- Understand steps in a court case
- Find legal information from trusted websites
- Organize your thoughts before talking to a lawyer

Follow these guidelines to use AI safely:

- Make sure the court allows you to use AI.
- Double-check everything AI gives you.
- Ask AI to provide sources and check them yourself.
- Check that websites provided are reliable and accurate.
- You must ask the court if any papers and forms provided by AI are correct.
- Consult with an attorney for legal advice, information and assistance.

Remember:

- AI is not a lawyer.
 - It may provide wrong answers, even if it claims to be accurate.
 - It may give advice that will not help your case or is not in your best interests.
 - Don't share your personal or private information.
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
