On March 11, 2021, Oregon Chief Justice Martha Walters issued Chief Justice Order (CJO) 21-009 imposing updated restrictions on court operations during the COVID-19 pandemic. Section 2 of CJO 21-009 addresses the mode of conducting certain court proceedings. Among other things, that provision authorizes the Presiding Judge of each judicial district to issue a Presiding Judge Order (PJO) describing the types of court proceedings that may be conducted in person while CJO 21-XXX is in effect.

Accordingly, pursuant to CJO 21-009, I order as follows:

I. Proceedings Generally Conducted In Person. The following types of proceeding generally may be conducted in person:

A. Criminal Cases

Proceedings where defendant is in-custody Grand Jury proceedings Jury trials

B. Civil Cases

Jury Trials

C. Domestic Relations Cases

The following Family Law motions when presented by individuals appearing in person *ex parte*: immediate danger motions; motions for orders of assistance; motions for order to show cause re: modification of judgment or contempt; motions for alternative service; motions for pre-judgment status quo order; motion for appointment of guardian ad litem for identity change; and other motions approved for presentation in-person by the Chief Family Law Judge.

D. Juvenile Cases

Delinquency--adjudications, waiver and dispositional hearings

E. Other Cases

FED ex parte hearings Small Claims court hearings and trials

II. Proceedings Generally Conducted by Remote Means. All other court proceedings will be conducted by remote means (audio and/or video), except that the court may permit or require occasional in-person appearances in the following types of proceedings, as appropriate to meet the needs of the litigants, the court, and/or the community:

A. Criminal Cases

Out-of-custody arraignments Out-of-custody plea hearings Out-of-custody hearings on release conditions, bail, or other pretrial release issues **Judicial Settlement Conferences** Substitution/waiver of counsel hearings Pre-trial motion hearings Probation violation hearings Probable cause hearings Sentencing hearings Restitution hearings Civil compromise hearings Fitness to proceed hearings Case management hearings Docket management/call Specialty court proceedings Bench trials

B. Civil Cases

Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) hearings Miscellaneous *ex parte* hearings (usually involving at least one self-represented litigant) Bench trials

C. Domestic Relations Cases

Trial Assignments
Protective Order applications

D. Juvenile Cases

Dependency trials, Termination of Parental Rights trials, and other Domestic Relations, Juvenile, and Probate proceedings where a party's request to appear in person is granted by the Presiding Judge or designate based on the unique circumstances of the case.

E. Other Cases

FED first appearances, motion hearings, & trials Traffic court trials Parking trials

In any proceeding where in-person appearances are permitted, all judges, staff, and participants must comply with social distancing requirements, protective face covering requirements, and all other safety requirements described in CJO 21-XXX.

This order takes effect immediately and shall remain in effect until modified, lifted or extended by further order of the court.
