

SPECIAL POINTS OF INTEREST:

- In 2016, the Latino population is 57million, 18% of the US population.
- People of Mexican origin account for about two-thirds of the nation's Latino population.
- The Latino population in Oregon is growing and reached a total of 473,729 people in 2014.
- In June 2018, 1,218 Latino children entered foster care in Oregon for at least 1 day.

TIPS ON WORKING WITH INTERPRETERS:

- Ask interpreters at the start if they have any suggestions...
- Most interpret simultaneously, so go slow, but do not wait.
- One person talks at a time!!!
- Let interpreters stop you if they need further information.
- Avoid colloquialisms and acronyms.
- Always thank the interpreters!
