### Overcoming Obstacles

I recently asked Jose Torres, CLAS Spanish Staff Interpreter, what some of his biggest obstacles were when he was studying for the certification exams.

1. Integrating studying, and recording myself interpreting in my weekly routines. Once I found a schedule that worked for me, it was easier. Practicing vocabulary became part of my weekly runs and my commute.
2. When I started using the ACEBO books it felt like it had too much information to learn. Organizing my schedule to cover one or two lessons a week made it manageable.
3. It is easy to feel like you have more than enough time between now and the day of the exam. Don't fall in that trap! Get organized, and come up with a plan that takes advantage of all the time you have available to prepare for the exams.
