Consecutive and Simultaneous, differences (court interpreting)

- Simultaneity of delivering message while listening and speaking
- Audience
- Mental Speed
- ► Noise interference

Initial mindset:

Always be coherent and use natural target language

- Be faithful to meaning and intention
- Be as complete as possible

► How to start

- Use predictable materials (use your consecutive practices)
- Context and redundance are helpful

Slow wpm, but not unnaturally slow

Techniques important for simultaneous

Chunking and paraphrasing

Décalage

Start when you can finish a sentence (in form and structure)

(You know THAT you can, albeit not How)

Golden rules when <u>starting</u> simultaneous

- Make sense, always
- Speak grammatically

Quality over quantity (of output)

Golden rules for <u>advancing in</u> simultaneous

- More complete (content)
- More natural in target language (form)
- Quality and quantity (precision and completeness)



Golden rules for <u>advancing in</u> simultaneous

- For more completeness: revisit décalage (keep up with speaker)
 - ► Too short?
 - ►Too long?
 - ▶ Experiment
 - Adjust depending on source content



Golden rules for <u>advancing in</u> simultaneous

- For better form: mastery A & B languages
 - Avoid calcs
 - Avoid unnatural target language structures
 - Intonation and confidence (read out loud)



Golden rules for <u>advancing in all modes</u>

- Record yourself
- Analyze your recordings
- Repetition of exercises
 - Keep track of your progress (assessment log)
 - ► Repetition of exercises is key

Tips for Simultaneous:

- 1. You need to listen actively (understand), analyze (structure of message) and reproduce (communicate).
- 2. Don't block your ears trying to think of one term.
- 3. Total mastery of A and B languages.
- 4. Mastery of chunking and paraphrasing techniques.
- 5. Décalage that is tailored to you and to the speech.
- 6. Keep up with the speaker (WPM).
- 7. Sound natural and confident.
