Why Data?

Data helps us see patterns
Informs our decision-making process
Shows us where to ask more questions

Descriptive June 30th, 2020

ICWA Eligible in a Placement

- > 292 kids in care
 - ► 5% of total population
- Average age: 10.1
- Average length of time in care: 34.3 months
- Average number of placements: 4
- Most common placements
 - Non-relative foster home
 - Relative foster home
 - Residential Facility

Not ICWA Eligible in a Placement

- ▶ 5592 kids in care
- ► Average age: 9.2
- Average length of time in care 28.2 months
- Average number of placements: 3.5
- Most common placements
 - Non-relative foster home
 - Relative foster home
 - ► Kith/kin foster home

Disproportionality November 2012- October 2017

Assessments on an ICWA eligible child were founded 36% more often than those of a noneligible child

ICWA eligible children entered foster care 45% more frequently than non-eligible children

Likely impacted by multiple systems impacts, as well as historic trauma and lack of relationships between these systems (ie. DHS) and tribal communities.

Disproportionality November 2012- October 2017

A child who is ICWA eligible exited to a guardianship 139% more often than their noneligible peers.

While reunification is the preferred outcome, when that is not possible ICWA & Oregon Tribal-State agreements prefer guardianship to adoption.

Initial ICWA Compliance Findings January 2017- November 2019

- Requested by ICWA Compliance Case Mapping Subcommittee in 2019
- Reviewed 108 cases over 6 different decision points, 9 cases/18 observations per decision point
- Primary purpose was a fiscal analysis of the cost of doing a statistically significant study

Initial ICWA Compliance Findings January 2017- November 2019

Very initial findings, small sample size
 Screening 50-75% compliant
 <u>Assessment, Removal, Permanency</u>,

Guardianship, Adoption, less than 25% compliant

Areas of struggle: Active Efforts, Ongoing Collaboration with the Tribe

Initial ICWA Compliance Findings January 2017- November 2019

- Oregon Indian Child Welfare Act (OICWA) passed in 2020
- Changes to policy, practice and systems are currently in place for all involved/impacted systems
- Larger compliance study will be revisited.

Takeaways

There are strong patterns of outcomes for Tribal children & families

- Case-specific & trend data can spark interest in how you make your decisions
- Data + Information can better equip you to ask questions in your critical role
